## Country Club Hills girl in statewide donation awareness campaign

Country Club Hills – In 2009, 11-year-old Country Club Hills resident Amaris Stokes received a sclera implant, giving her a second chance for sight, thanks to the generosity of an eye donor and their family. This year, she’s helping encourage others to consider signing up on the Illinois Organ/Tissue Donor Registry.

Amaris, along with four other pediatric eye tissue recipients, is featured on a new poster with Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White, part of campaign aimed at increasing public awareness about the need for eye donation.

“The Secretary of State has made eye, organ and tissue donation awareness a priority of his office,” says Diane Hollingsworth, Executive Director of the Illinois Eye-Bank. “We are honored to have our young transplant recipients take part in this poster project. Receiving sight-restoring surgery during childhood will dramatically increase their chances for lifetime success. Seeing children who’ve benefitted from the gift of sight reminds everyone of the value of donation.”

The posters are being introduced just in time for National Eye Donor Month, which has been recognized every March since 1983. Last year alone, more than 1,000 Illinois residents, like Amaris, received a second chance for sight through cornea transplants.

The posters will be distributed to local hospitals, schools, libraries and driving facilities throughout the state.
